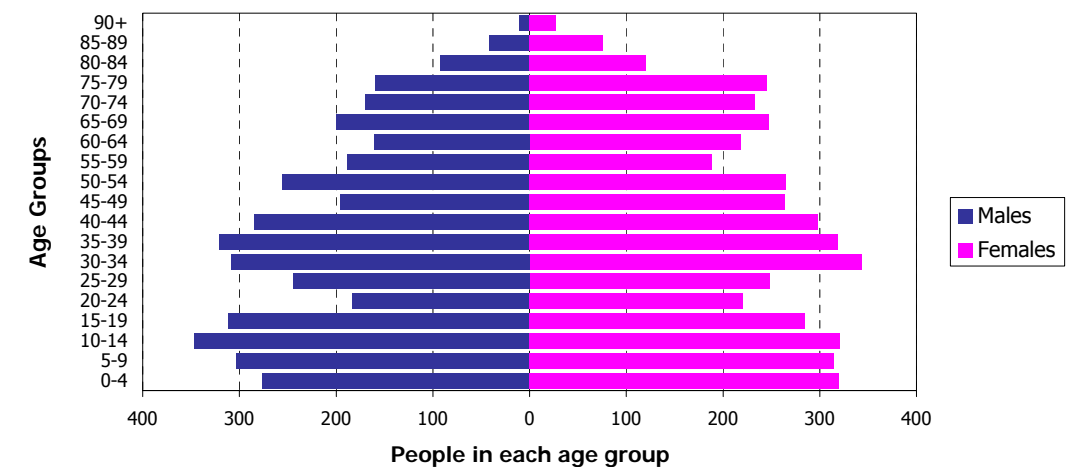

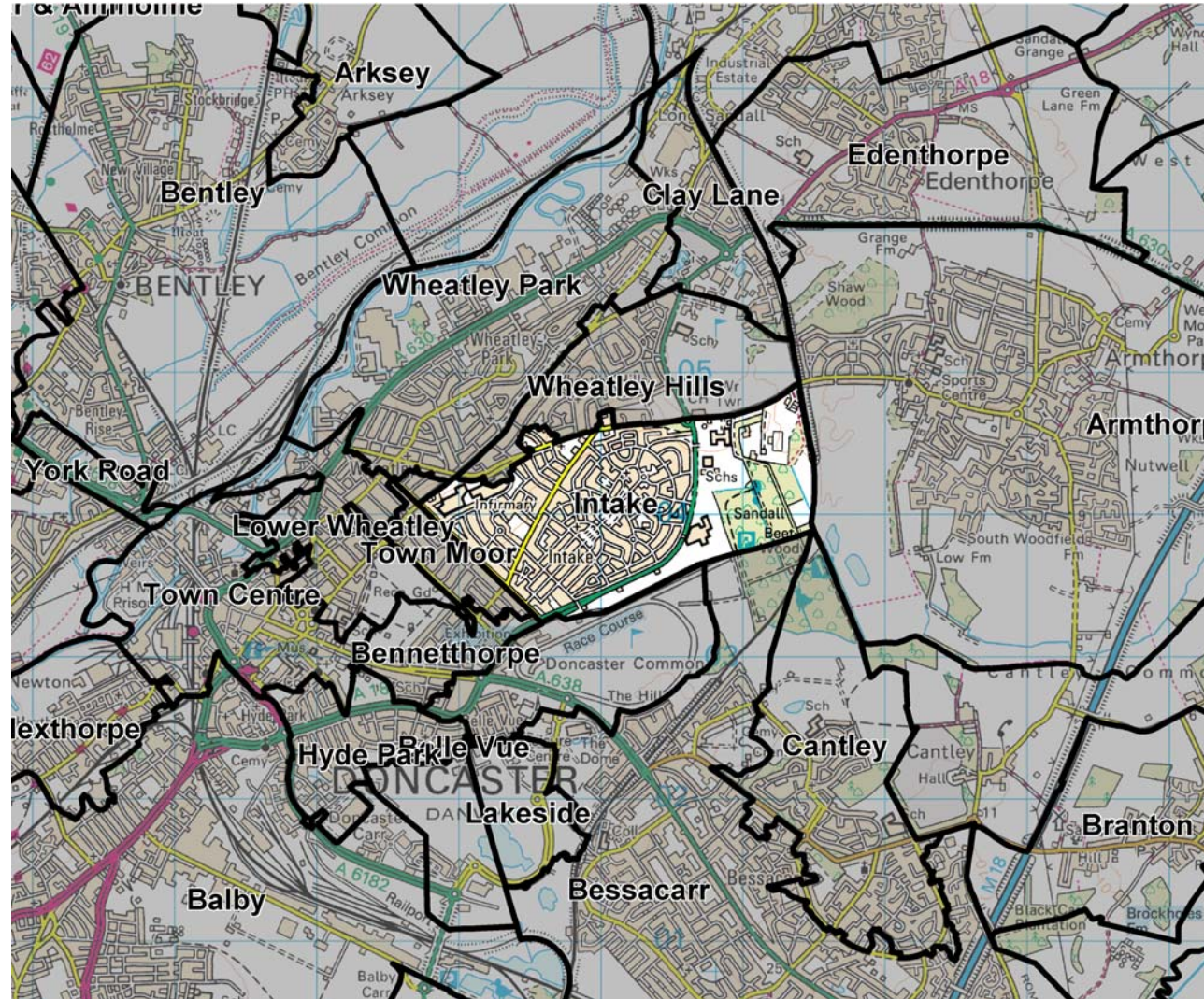

Births and Child Health

There were 330 births in Intake between 2001 and 2003. The general period fertility rate is 64.5 live births per 1,000 women aged 15–44, significantly above the Doncaster average of 56.4 per 1,000.

Modelled Prevalence Data

Using national survey data, we can predict that, in Intake:

- 1,470 adults (22.3% of the 16+ population) and 123 children (6.9%) are obese
- 570 adults (8.6% of the 16+ population) have coronary heart disease
- 140 males (3.5% of the population) and 239 females (5.3%) have diabetes
